



Fire Prevention Week Open House at Parksville Firehall on October 4

Parksville, BC: Each year, the Parksville Fire Department participates in Fire Prevention Week and will again this year open its doors to the public on Sunday, October 4 from 10 am to 2 pm. Fire Prevention Week is being recognized from October 4 to October 10. The open house will take place at the fire hall which is located at 160 Jensen Avenue West, Parksville.

Members of the community are encouraged to drop by for a little fun and most importantly, to learn some possible lifesaving strategies for fire prevention. Firefighters will be giving tours of the station, including trucks and equipment so be sure to bring your camera.

The RCMP will be on site as well, providing a child restraint technician to conduct inspection of car seats for the public. If you would like to have your car seat inspected, please bring your car manual as well as the restraint manual so these can be referenced during the inspection. Also, the seat should be installed in the vehicle prior to arriving at the fire hall.

“This open house is an opportunity to showcase the services we provide to the community and for our department to provide fire safety information to our residents,” said Fire Chief Doug Banks.

The theme for this year is *Hear the Beep Where You Sleep*® which underscores the importance of having a working smoke alarm in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of your home, including the basement. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. You need working smoke alarms to give you time to get out. Test yours every month!

The Parksville Fire Department would like families to focus on preventing fire by planning ahead and integrating a few simple fire safety behaviours into everyday lives. By paying attention and eliminating potential fire hazards in your home, you can make a difference that will prevent or reduce fire related injuries, deaths and property damage.

History of Fire Prevention Week

The Great Chicago Fire of 1871 which lasted two days, October 8 and 9 and killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless and burned more than 2,000 acres. That fire forever changed the way public officials viewed fire safety. To mark the 40th anniversary of this tragic event, the Fire Marshals Association of North America deemed the most appropriate commemoration was to do everything they could to educate and inform the public about the importance of fire safety and prevention. Since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed from Sunday through to the Saturday that October 9 falls on.
