Protecting Your Water Supply

With the recent spring rain, it's easy to forget that water is our most precious and limited resource. In fact, just 3% of the world's water is fresh and less than one third of 1% is available for human use. The City strives to be a water efficient community and over the next month, please watch for articles about the City's water services and programs administered by our Engineering and Operations Department

Whether we turn on our faucets or set out sprinklers, the water that spills out is fresh, potable water that comes from rain and snowmelt collected in our watershed, reservoir and groundwater aquifers. During the winter months, the reservoir is expected to fill to capacity. In the dry summer months, when we use more water than can be refilled and supplied, we must be careful with our water in order to prevent summer shortages.

As well as meeting demand for water, there are some real money matters to consider for using water wisely. The cost of water involves:

- Maintaining infrastructure for water supply and distribution
- Treatment and disposal of wastewater
- Building reserve funds for future water intake and treatment facility

Why Stage 2 watering restrictions?

- It's the best way to conserve as typical landscape and lawns only need water twice a week during summer.
- We do not have the luxury of gravity to convey and distribute potable water; mechanical pumps and controls are required. As a resort-based municipality with an influx of visitors, large areas of parkland, sports playing fields to maintain and the requirements of our residents, our river intake and mechanical pumps run at over 85% capacity on peak summer days which is not sustainable. Non-watering days allow our mechanical systems, aquifers and reservoirs to properly recover.
- Our Englishman River water intake gallery is in need of additional repair and maintenance this year. The work requires DFO and MoE permits and can only be done during summer months within a certain fisheries window.
- Direct move to Stage 2 saves money and confusion for residents as irrigation systems only need to be programmed once.
- The City requires a new river intake and enhanced treatment facility. Using water wisely allows the City to save money annually to put towards this costly infrastructure upgrade.

Stage 2 Watering Restrictions are now in effect. Watering times are 7 am to 10 am and 7 pm to 10 pm. Even numbered properties may water on Wednesday and Saturdays and odd numbered properties on Thursday and Sundays. Vegetable gardens, shrubs and flowers may be watered with a hand-held hose, preferably with a shut-off nozzle.
