We're Ready for Snow... Are You?

Operating within budget and with available equipment and personnel, our operations department is ready to provide for reasonably safe movement of vehicle and pedestrian traffic during winter conditions. Despite the best efforts of a highly motivated crew, snow and ice conditions can deteriorate and roads can become treacherous.

Clearing of sidewalks is the responsibility of property owners. Every owner and occupier of property is responsible under Bylaw 1436 to remove all snow or ice from sidewalks bordering their property within 12 hours of the end of the snowfall. During periods of heavy snowfall and during regular hours of operation, City crews will support public clearing of sidewalks on streets with high pedestrian traffic, such as arterials and roads in the downtown core.

Wherever possible, drivers are asked to not park on streets during snowfall as this impedes the travel of plows and may result in vehicles buried by snow. As well, residents are asked to remove garbage cans from roadways during snow events. Please consider these items for personal preparedness in the

event of heavy snowfall:

- Motorists should practice defensive driving and exercise caution at all times.
- Have a supply of candles and/or flashlights and ensure cell phones are regularly charged in the event power and/or telephone services are interrupted.
- Ensure an adequate supply of any required medications, infant formula and supplies, pet foods and nonperishable food items should roads be temporarily impassable and stores closed.
- If it is not absolutely necessary to travel, stay home, keep warm, dry and safe.

City staff monitor road and weather conditions 24/7 during



winter months. When snow and icy conditions are forecast, crews and equipment are prepped and when it snows, crews are dispatched to keep roads safe.

The City's first priority during and after a snowfall is to clear major arterial streets (Island Highway, Alberni Highway) as well as access to emergency services (RCMP, fire hall, ambulance station). Clearing collector streets (such as Temple, Pym, Hirst) is the second priority. Once conditions have stabilized on priority routes, crews will begin to clear residential streets. Should snowfall continue, crews may take longer to reach residential streets. Should there be an emergency, call 911 and emergency services will advise the City to send a plow immediately.

During a significant snowfall, one lane of Island Highway East (Highway 19A) between Corfield and McCarter Streets will be closed to allow safe use of the slope from Island Highway into the Community Park sports field for tobogganing. Traffic control measures will facilitate the temporary lane closure.

Special Events Application Procedures

Every year, we receive applications from community organizations and individuals wishing to hold special events at City-owned venues. Venues were well used with 249 bookings in 2015. Streets and parks accommodated many walks, marathons and cycling events and thousands of residents and visitors enjoyed an energetic year of festivals, sporting events and family celebrations in the Community Park and newly upgraded Foster Park.

Applications are being accepted for 2016 events with the review process beginning January 29. 2016 Business Licences

Existing business licence holders may now renew for the 2016 calendar year. Fees are due by January 8 and may be mailed or paid at City Hall. Bylaw 1483 requires all businesses obtain a valid licence if carrying on business in the City. More information may be found on the website [Business/Licences].

2016 Dog Licences

Dog licence fees are due by January 29. Current dog licences will receive a reminder notice; if you do not receive a notice and currently own a dog, licences may be purchased from City Hall.



- By January 29 Spayed/neutered \$20, not spayed/neutered \$30
- After January 29 Spayed/neutered \$25, not spayed/neutered \$35

The main benefit of licensing is the quick return of dogs should they become lost. As well, fees collected partially offset the cost to maintain our off-leash dog park, provide doggie bags and dispensers throughout the City and provide bylaw enforcement to handle public safety concerns of stray, off-leash and dangerous dogs.

And, it's the law! Parksville Bylaw 1284 states, "No person shall keep, harbour or have in his possession any dog over the age of six months unless a valid and subsisting licence has been issued in respect of that dog." The bylaw also states no more than two dogs may be kept on parcels of land less than two acres.

Christmas Tree Disposal

Trees are an integral part of holiday celebrations, but what to do with them when Christmas is over? Leaving them on sidewalks/boulevards interferes with pedestrian traffic and impedes vehicle sightlines. Because the City is not responsible for disposing of Christmas trees, here are a few options:

- Trees may be taken to the Church Road Transfer Station.
- Service groups may hold fundraising chipping events; watch PQB News for notices.
- · Check the classifieds for individuals/companies offering disposal services.
- Store tree on your property to be included with the City's spring wood chipping program.
