Goose Management Strategy


In 2015, Council adopted recommendations contained in the Goose Management Strategy for the Mount Arrowsmith Biosphere Region as prepared by the Guardians of Mid-Island Estuaries Society. Council approved a cull program in 2016 as a more permanent long-term solution to the overabundance of non-migratory Canada Geese in Parksville. A key recommendation of the strategy is to humanely reduce non-migratory resident Canada Goose populations in the City to a level which prevents conflict between geese and human activities and reduces the ecological damage to

Since 2004, mitigation initiatives have been ongoing with limited success. Examples include hazing using dogs and volunteers and the use of a falconer with an eagle to harass geese. Since 2002, members of the Guardians led efforts to reduce regional Canada Goose populations by addling over 6,000 eggs and have surveyed geese in the region to learn more about seasonal abundance and use of estuaries and other habitats. The City funds an ongoing addling program focused on the Englishman River and despite successful addling from 2002 through 2014 which prevented many eggs from hatching, the number of nesting geese in the Englishman River estuary continues to increase.


Across all seasons, counts were highest at the estuaries of the Parksville-Qualicum Beach Wildlife Management Area. During the summer molt, geese concentrate in the estuaries and in marine and freshwater habitats; estuaries are preferred destinations in the fall and winter.

Urban and agricultural areas also suffers. Goose densities were found to be highest in the Parksville Church Road and Parksville Bay/City areas and in particular, on sites with access to freshwater. High concentrations of geese lead to the contamination of drinking water, the fouling of beaches, parks, school grounds, sports fields and other sites, all of which pose risks to human and animal health.

The City will implement the annual water main flushing program February 15 to March 25. Flushing is an important part of ongoing maintenance to ensure the integrity of the water supply system. Flushing will take place mainly between 7 am and 3:30 pm, Monday to Friday. During these times, residents can expect some discolouration of water and intermittent drops in pressure and should keep a fresh supply of drinking water on hand.
