
City Delivers Balanced Budget

The City delivered a balanced budget for the 2019 financial year with Council setting the overall property tax increase for 2019 at 2.5% for all classes except Class 5 light industry, set at 10%. This increase is higher in order to equalize the light industry rate to be more in line with the business property class rate. The tax increase is budgeted to be 3% for 2020 and 3.5% for 2021 to 2023.

The consolidated budget of just over \$37.5 million includes capital expenditures of \$16.3 million. Major capital in 2019 includes such projects as the new water treatment project, land acquisition, pickleball courts, playground resurfacing, Pym and Forsyth refurbishment, Moss Avenue and McKinnon Street upgrade, trail to Rathtrevor Beach Provincial Park, new ladder and rescue trucks for the fire department and other minor road replacements. Memorial Ave Project Underway

The City has launched the Memorial Avenue streetscape and utility upgrades project which will plan, design and construct upgrades to aging underground water and sanitary sewer lines along Memorial as well as improvements to the streetscape with the aim to maintain the historic street trees and enhance their health. The work will include replacement of underground utilities, including existing asbestos cement water, storm sewer and sanitary sewer mains with modern PVC pipes. Improvements to vehicular, pedestrian and bicycle movements, formalization of street parking and improved utilization of public spaces will be incorporated into the streetscape design. Streetlighting will be upgraded to energy-efficient LED.

An assessment of the trees will provide an understanding of condition and opportunities to enhance their health and a comprehensive public consultation process will engage the community to ensure input is heard and considered prior to design and construction.

Memories on Memorial Walkshop - June 22

Residents are invited to join a walking tour beginning at the McMillan Arts Centre to celebrate the history of Memorial Avenue and collect input about the vision for the future of the street. Memories on Memorial Walkshop will share the history of the street, information about the century old elm trees and discuss considerations for the design concept. Input will help shape the street design and inform the project team about the community's vision for Memorial. An online story map will complement this event and share the same information for those not able to attend. Pre-registration is required. Details will be posted to our website later this month. 

THINGS TO KNOW...

June 17 Council Meetings - will be held at Knox United Church starting with Committee of the Whole at 4 pm and the Council meeting at 6 pm.

Reduced Water Pressure - on May 22 for residents in the vicinity of Maple Crescent, Hamilton and Butler Avenues between Craig Street and City boundary to the east.

Water Restriction Stage 2 - now in effect in the City through September unless otherwise advised. With Stage 2, sprinkling can only occur on even days for even-numbered houses and on odd days for odd-numbered houses for a maximum of two hours between 7-10 am or 7-10 pm. [Quicklinks/Water Conservation]

Permissive Tax Exemptions - under the provisions of the Community Charter, Council may exempt land and/or improvements from municipal property taxes for the next calendar year, subject to certain requirements which in general, restrict exemption to non-profit organizations using the lands for specific non-profit purposes. Application deadline is noon, June 28. Details, form and policy may be obtained from City Hall or from the website [City Hall/Mayor and Council/Permissive Tax Exemptions].

Parks, Trails and Open Spaces Master Plan - final draft will be presented to Council on May 22 and may be viewed from the City's website.
